The Foster Care Initiative under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) within Denver Public Schools (DPS) provides supplemental resources to district students residing in out of home placement.

A referral can be made to our services from the county case worker or through a district support staff familiar with the family.

Resource areas of support can include:

- Coordination of school meal assistance
- Backpacks/school supplies (*when available*)
- Basic-needs supplies (*when available*)
- Emergency food (*when available*)
- Emergency clothing needs (*when available as well as a referral to Clothes to Kids*)
- Emergency transportation assistance to/from DPS school (*case by case determination*)
- Assistance with school fees (*when financial assistance is available*) or help with the fee waiver process
- Holiday Assistance (*when available*)
- Community resource navigation

What is ESSA?

The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) is a law passed in December 2015 that governs the United States K–12 public education policy. The law replaced the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB). Contains key protections for children in foster care that require state and local educational agencies to collaborate with child welfare agencies. The goal is to ensure the educational stability of children in foster care.

Overview of ESSA key points regarding foster care:

- Student will remain in school of origin (unless determined best interest to enroll at a new school. This is decided in a BID meeting- Best Interest Determination (which is coordinated by a child welfare case worker and CWEL.)
- Student can immediately enroll in the new neighborhood school (even if they lack records). This is decided in a BID meeting- Best Interest Determination (which is coordinated by a child welfare case worker and CWEL.)
- Enrollment must not be denied or delayed for any population of students because documents normally required for enrollment have not been provided
- Title I funds can be used in collaboration with state funds to help with transportation to school of origin

What can foster and kinship parents do?

- Connect with your child welfare agency to participate in BID meetings, obtain advocacy from your child welfare education liaison and connect to their agency resources.
- Self- identify as foster/kinship on the Federal Programs form at enrollment time
- Our program liaisons will reach out after receiving this form or school referral to provide information about our program services
- Call/email us for free meal coordination assistance and we can discuss school fees and waiver process for students in foster care
- Reach out for foster and kinship student school needs
- Explore our website for foster and kinship resources and reach out if we can help navigate questions on community and district resources
- Connect with your school for support and assistance

Colorado LEAP

CCAP provides financial assistance for newborns to children up to age 13 and for special needs youth up through age 18. Fill it out as completely as possible and drop it off at one of our three DHS locations. Call with any questions at 720-944-KIDS (5437) or email at denverccap@denvergov.org.

- Employed or self-employed and earn at least minimum wage for the hours worked.
- Attending high school, attending college for your first bachelor's degree or other vocational program, or working towards earning a GED or ESL (Denver may cover up to 12 months of education support.)
- For individuals currently searching for employment, Denver child care assistance may cover up to 30 days.
